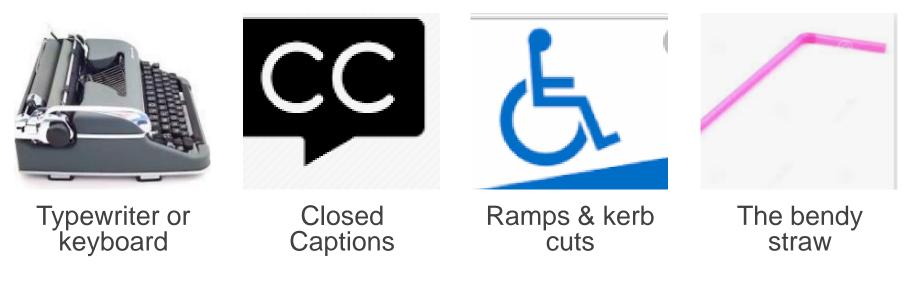
15 % of the world's population have a disability

Five themes of the ABC (Accessibility Business Case)



Diverse ideas create new opportunities

Inclusive design leaves no one behind

An inclusive brand outperforms Accessible solutions boost productivity for everyone Raising the bar reduces the risks

83% of disabilities are acquired.

The average age of acquiring a disability is 53.

Over 90% of disabilities are not immediately visible.

So you almost certainly already employ more disabled people than you think you do!

Inclusion in mainstream tech

This isn't just about additional tech/assistive tech, Google, Microsoft, Apple and many other tech companies ensure they design inclusively, so that everyone can use their products.



It's more than just the tech

The weakest link might not be the tech, but the people using it. If you don't check your slides are accessible, then they probably won't be -Microsoft can't help you if you don't help yourselves



The big four in Assistive Tech....



Text to speech

Used for immediate read back, to check work or audio books

Information capture

What, where, when? Audio, images, links etc



Speech to text

Most commonly used for dictation or transcription and computer control



Mindmapping Planning, organisation and idea capture

How to increased adoption and benefit

- IT Department
 - Ensure tech isn't the barrier
- Positive peer pressure
 - Blend in, make it mainstream
- Training
 - Training, superusers, training and context
- Personal and organisational benefits
 - Reposition the adjustment, focus on the benefits, not the deficit

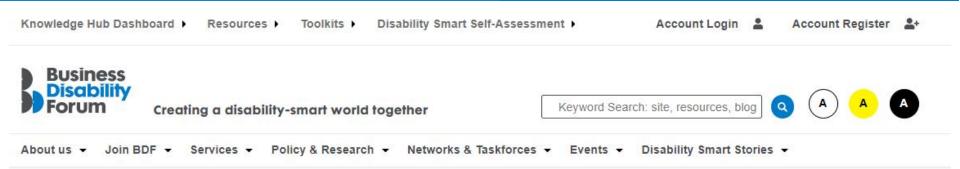


What gets measured gets done
